The purpose of the Program in Medical Anthropology is to provide structure and concentration of study for graduate students in this subfield within the Department's graduate curriculum. In addition, by creating a formalized program, we intend to use more fully the training and research resources that exist in the Departments of Epidemiology, Health Education, and Social and Administrative Medicine at UNC. In order to provide quality of preparation and training in medical anthropology, a specialized program has been designed.

- The overall purpose of the Program in Medical Anthropology is to create a curriculum structure that will offer our students solid anthropological training, coupled with extensive preparation in behavioral and health science. This graduate program is designed to offer special training for the variety of students preparing for careers as medical anthropologists.
- The Program in Medical Anthropology will require graduate students to obtain broad training in anthropology by choosing electives from one or more of the concentrations offered in the Department pertinent to the students' interests in medical anthropology.
- Cross-disciplinary studies and training are an important part of medical anthropology. Health professionals from a variety of disciplines are interested in and currently active in the field, and anthropology students have much to gain from extended discourse with persons trained in the health sciences. By allowing health professionals (trained or in training) access to a specialized program, we encourage the growth and development of medical anthropology.
- Students in the Program in Medical Anthropology will have to meet all requirements specified in the Doctoral Program requirements. The qualifying examinations will include one component of special questions designed to assess the student's competency in medical anthropology and the special interests of the individual student.
- The graduate advisor and faculty of the Program in Medical Anthropology will meet with each medical anthropology student during the first semester to assess the student's strength and weaknesses and prescribe a course of study accordingly.

**Minimum Graduate Admission Requirements**

- A bachelor's degree completed before graduate study begins or its international equivalent with an accredited institution (based on a four-year curriculum); and
- An average grade of B (GPA 3.0) or better for the last two years of study.

Along with these minimal requirements, admission decisions are based on a number of factors, including academic degrees and record, statement of purpose, letters of recommendation, test scores, and relevant work experience. There are currently no residency quotas for admission, with the exception of the Medical Allied Health Professions, where 75 percent of those applicants offered admission must be North Carolina residents.

The required minimum total score on the paper-based TOEFL exam is 550 with a minimum of 50 in each section; comparable scores are required on the computer-based exam. Some programs require a higher score and the Graduate School honors that requirement. TOEFL scores are reportable for a period of two years from date of the exam. Exam results more than two years old will not be reported by ETS, and thus cannot be considered by us. TOEFL scores that are submitted to this institution are kept on file for only one year.

The Sociomedical Sciences Ph.D. program is interdisciplinary, with study divided between the Mailman School of Public Health and one social science department in the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences (Anthropology, Economics, History, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology, or Psychology).

The aim of the program is to train researchers and teachers to apply social science theory and methods to the study of social factors related to health status and health care needs, the social systems, and the relation between these systems and the populations they are designed to serve.

Students who enter the program with a bachelor's degree complete a minimum of 60 points; those with a health or social science master's degree may be eligible for advanced standing with a corresponding reduction in course requirements. Following coursework there may be a language or statistics requirement depending upon the social science in which the student elects to concentrate.

All students complete qualifying examinations in their social science area and in methods, health behavior, and health care systems. The dissertation topic, a public health problem or issue of interest to the student, is addressed using social science theories, concepts, and methods.

Graduates of the program have typically been employed in academic positions either in social science departments or health professional schools, or have taken positions as analysts or evaluation researchers in health planning agencies or consulting organizations.

ENGLISH Judgments concerning equivalency of international baccalaureate degrees are made by the Graduate School. In general, only those international students who (a) have the equivalent of the U.S. baccalaureate degree with a superior examination record and (b) can understand rapid idiomatic English and can speak, write, and read English with a high degree of facility are eligible for admission. All international students whose native language is not English and who have not received an undergraduate degree from an institution in which English was the medium of instruction must submit scores of the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL), administered in foreign countries by the Educational Testing Service. The Graduate School normally requires a score of 600 on the paper-and-pencil-test or 250 on the computer-based test.

Prior to their initial registration in the Graduate School, all non-native English speakers are required to sit for the English Placement Test administered by the American Language Program of Columbia University. Should the results warrant, the student may be required to take English language courses in addition to ordinary degree work. All non-native English speakers who wish to hold teaching appointments must also sit for the SPEAK test of spoken English, also administered by the American Language Program. We urge all international students to apply by the January 3 deadline.

Emory's graduate program in Anthropology balances rigorous core courses with a tutorial approach to advanced subjects and is designed to be intense and demanding for students and faculty. We encourage a diversity of doctoral research agendas across the entire range of cultural and biological anthropology, from the postmodern to the sociobiological. It is the exposure to alternative explanatory paradigms rather than a monolithic theoretical orientation that we think will prove both intellectually important and professionally successful in the anthropology of the future. The core program is a series of courses and seminars that gives advanced training in cultural and biological anthropology including a seminar team-taught by cultural and biological anthropologists. As a whole, the educational program provides students with a graduate-level grounding in cultural and biological anthropology that is sophisticated and unique. Specialization within cultural or biological sub-fields is encouraged, as well as combinations and creative dialogues between them, including those that draw upon Medical Anthropology. The program requires three years of full-time course work, followed by dissertation research and write-up. Graduate training is supported for research in all major world areas.

The Center for Health, Culture, and Society was founded in the fall of 1993 to encourage interdisciplinary and comparative approaches to problems of public health importance. Since its inception, the Center has sought to create a common meeting ground for social and health scientists, humanists, and health professionals interested in exploring the interplay of health, culture, and society.

In addition, the Center has striven to achieve a closer integration of academic scholarship and health intervention activities; to develop a global perspective on health that bridges the divide between domestic and international health issues; and to employ the insights gained from the Center's activities to develop innovative approaches to teaching, research, and health policy formation and implementation.

Emory's graduate program in Anthropology receives applications from a wide range of the most highly qualified national and international candidates. Students with research interests in any branch of cultural or biological anthropology are encouraged to apply. We strongly encourage applications from minority and foreign students; our program has a strong record of supporting students' needs in these as well as other areas. All students admitted are funded at a stipend level of at least \$14,000 yearly for three years of coursework and (pending satisfactory continuation) an additional year and a half of thesis write-up upon return from their doctoral research field site. Additional support funds are also available. Because of this high level of support for all students, our program must be highly selective in its admission process. The average incoming class is 5 to 7 students.

Medical anthropology at Berkeley is one of the pioneering programs in the discipline both nationally and globally. Together with its sister program at UCSF and the broader intellectual resources of Berkeley's anthropology department and the rest of the Berkeley campus, the program provides disciplinary leadership and outstanding and comprehensive training leading to the Ph.D. degree. No other program offers the Joint Program's combination of excellence in critical medical anthropology, studies of science, technology and modernity, intersections of medicine and social theory, and cutting edge scholarship in the analysis of many fields. Graduate students work in these and in many other fields, on single and multi-sited projects located around the world. The regional expertise of the Berkeley core and affiliated faculty in anthropology includes recent and ongoing research throughout the world. Students may apply for entry into the doctoral program in Berkeley medical anthropology. Graduate students in medical anthropology at Berkeley take most of the same courses and work with many of the same faculty as graduate students in social cultural anthropology and graduate students entering the UCSF side of the program, but emphases and requirements differ between these programs. In judging applications, the Department is interested (in order of importance) in:

- Statement of purpose.
- Letters of recommendation.
- Grade point average.
- GRE or TOEFL scores.

*Statement of Purpose*  
The applicant's Statement of Purpose should be concise (approximately 1000 words) and very explicit about the applicant's interests and anthropological goals. These statements are read carefully and are taken very seriously. If the applicant wishes to submit a sample of his or her written work, the sample should be brief (no more than three pages).

*Letters of Recommendation*  
The Department prefers that referees use the recommendation forms provided with the application form (Form G), but will accept any written reference. If evaluators choose to use their own format for their letter, please ask that they include some sort of ranking, as is requested on the prepared form.

*GRE or TOEFL Scores*  
All English-speaking applicants are required to take the General Test of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) and to have their scores on this examination reported to the Anthropology Department at the University of California, Berkeley by the Educational Testing Service. Foreign applicants whose native language is English and those who have studied for one year or more in schools or universities where English is the language of instruction must fulfill this GRE requirement. Foreign applicants whose native language is not English and who have not studied in an English-speaking university must take the TOEFL test, but do not need to submit GRE scores

An intensive graduate program in medical anthropology is offered as a departmental concentration area. Students are broadly trained in anthropology in a department which encourages an integration of all subfields of anthropology as well as an engaged approach to anthropology which equally values the advancement of theory and the application of anthropology in contemporary problem solving. A suite of 11 graduate seminars in subjects directly related to medical anthropology are regularly offered in the department. Students are exposed to a full range of theories as well as thematic areas relevant for medical anthropology. Courses range in focus from anthropology of the body, health and illness to health and the human life cycle, biocultural anthropology to political ecology, ethnomedicine to applications of anthropology in clinical and community contexts, international health and women in development to public policy, and adolescent health to gender, health and sexuality. Graduate courses are available elsewhere on campus for students who wish to receive complementary training in epidemiology, public health, medical geography, and women's studies.

Medical anthropology has been a concentration in the department since 1980 and since 1986 the department has offered one of the most rigorous PhD training programs in medical anthropology in the country. Between two and three students are generally admitted to the program each year. In the past 15 years, about an equal number of students have chosen to carry out field research in the US and in other countries (Africa, Carribean , Latin and South America , Middle East, Pacific Basin, South and Southeast Asia, Middle East). Students have the opportunity to pursue a Masters in Public Health (MPH) as a complement to their medical anthropology training. A graduate certificate in medical anthropology for motivated health science professionals and gifted developing world social scientists is offered by the department for scholars who wish to receive specialized training. A MD/ Ph.D. program is possible to pursue.

Students with an MA in anthropology may apply to the Ph.D. program. Admission to the Department is highly competitive. The Admissions Committee requires, in addition to the application and transcripts provided to the Graduate College:

- One official transcript from each post-secondary institution that the applicant has attended.
- A minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.50 for the BA, BS, MA, and MS degrees.
- A minimum score of 600 on each of the sections of the Graduate Record Examination, which must have been taken no earlier than five years prior to the application date.
- Two letters of recommendation sent directly to the department; preferably from academically qualified persons who are familiar with the applicant's academic work.
- A Department Application form.
- A statement of purpose, which is an essay on why the applicant wants a higher degree in anthropology and especially why the applicant is applying to the University of Arizona.
- International Applicants provide TOEFL scores instead of GRE scores if they are not enrolled in English-speaking institutions.

The Joint Doctoral Program in Social Work and Social Science is an interdepartmental program in the Horace H. Rackham School of Graduate Studies at the University of Michigan. It awards a joint Ph.D. degree in **Social Work** and one of five social science disciplines- **Anthropology, Economics, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology.**

It accepted its first students in 1957 and was the first program of its kind. Affording students the opportunity for individualized study with internationally recognized scholars in a wide variety of research domains in social work and social science, the Joint Program in Social Work and Social Science at the University of Michigan is broadly acknowledged as one of the finest interdisciplinary programs in the world.

Graduates of the Joint Program are highly recruited with the vast majority being offered positions immediately following the completion of their Ph.D. studies. Many of its alumnae and alumni have attained leadership positions throughout the world as distinguished educators, researchers, senior administrators, practitioners, analysts, and activists.

The Department of Sociology at Princeton University has an international reputation for the quality of its teaching and research. Its approximately 20 full-time faculty have interests that span the sociology of culture, economic sociology and organizations, migration and development, social demography, social inequality, and regional and comparative studies. Recent faculty recruitment has strengthened the department's methodological capability in urban ethnography and advanced statistics. There are about 40 graduate students in residence and 80 undergraduate majors. Regular workshops in culture and inequality, economic sociology, religion and public policy, and social demography, together with supervised independent research projects among junior and senior majors, facilitate close student-faculty interaction.

**The Center for Research on Child Wellbeing (CRCW)** conducts research on children's health, education, income, and family structure. Our faculty is made up of economists, sociologists, demographers, psychologists, and political scientists. The Center hosts visitors, supports postdoctoral fellows, and students at the graduate and undergraduate levels. Our goal is to promote basic research on children's wellbeing and link research to practice and public policy.

Departments recommend admission by comparing the academic merits of all applicants applying in the same field. Academic records are examined to determine whether the applicant has established a firm basis for graduate work in the proposed field of study. Letters of recommendation and the personal statement are given very serious consideration and some departments require submission of prior work. The results of the Graduate Record Examination provide additional evidence of the applicant's aptitude and knowledge. Consideration is given to scholarly promise as well as achievement.

Admission to the Graduate School is highly competitive. Historically, one in seven applicants has been offered admission.

When an applicant fails to provide required materials by the application deadline, his or her chances of being admitted are severely limited. The Graduate School will not admit applicants who seek to earn a second Ph.D. in the same or a closely related field. Applicants may apply to only one academic department or program in any given admission year. The Graduate School does not require or conduct interviews, although some departments may welcome them.

**Policy on English Language Program**

In order to take full advantage of the education that Princeton University affords them, graduate students must demonstrate a level of oral proficiency in the English language sufficient to be able to participate successfully in all of the various activities comprised by graduate education. This includes class work, research, and teaching. The English Language Program determines students' English language needs and provides instruction and support to non-native speakers.

Accordingly, the Graduate School requires that all non-native speakers of English, who have not earned their undergraduate degree in an English-speaking college or university, have their oral English proficiency evaluated by the English Language Program staff. The diagnostic instrument used for incoming students is the SPEAK (Speaking Proficiency English Assessment Kit) test. At the recommendation of a University committee, the Graduate School has established that passing either the SPEAK test at a level of 50 or above or the Princeton Oral Proficiency Test (POPT) qualifies a graduate student to be appointed as an assistant in instruction (AI) and attests to the student's proficiency in spoken English.

**SOCIOLOGY**  
**FIELDS OF STUDY.** In addition to the core areas of theory, research methods, and statistics, the faculty have expertise in three broad areas within sociology. The social demography group examines families and children, migration, urbanization and international population issues.

The health group's research extends from individual health experiences to organizations and systems of care. The macrosociology group takes up issues of economic development, states and social institutions, and comparative organizations. Special emphasis is placed on the application of comparative-historical analyses, quantitative empirical research, and qualitative methods.

Three years of graduate study including courses in sociological theory and methods, multivariate analysis, research design and measurement, teaching and research practica, teaching: two semesters, preliminary examination in three areas of specialization approved by faculty and the Graduate Committee of the department, courses and areas of specialization outside department acceptable with prior approval of the Graduate Committee, dissertation and oral defense.

There are three emphases in the Sociology graduate training program at the University of Washington:

- Understanding and critically evaluating social theory and empirical research
- Doing theoretically guided research that explores, assesses, and further develops explanatory theories
- Developing communication skills (with emphasis on scholarly writing and teaching) that will be useful in transmitting sociological knowledge.

For students arriving with a bachelor's degree, the program involves two years of graduate coursework that is relatively structured. During those first two years students work on completing their MA degree requirements, including a master's thesis. Students apply for admission to the PhD program in the autumn quarter of their third year. At the PhD level, training is less structured and increasingly focused on the dissertation research. Completion of the PhD degree is expected in three additional years. During these years the department provides opportunities for graduate students to become research assistants or pre-doctoral teaching associates.

The Department of Sociology welcomes applications to our graduate program. In recent years, we have received between 150 and 200 applications per year and each year a cohort of 15 to 18 new graduate students is admitted into the Department. This page describes our program and provides downloadable application materials for the Department, and links to other necessary materials. Please take the time to read through all the materials carefully.

We automatically consider all applicants for both admission AND financial aid (details of financial aid options follow later in this information guide). If you have secured outside financial support (i.e. NSF Fellowship), please let us know. Minority applicants in particular might wish to explore resources available to them through programs at the University of Washington.

Most students admitted each year enter our M.A. program with the understanding that they wish to pursue a Ph.D. If you enter with an M.A. degree (which required a Master's thesis) in Sociology from another university, you will be admitted as a post-M.A. student initially. After approximately two quarters of study in our department, you can apply for admission into the Ph.D. program. If you enter with an M.A. degree in a field other than Sociology, you will most likely be admitted as a pre-M.A. student here and be expected to complete an M.A. degree in Sociology before you would be able to apply for entry into the Ph.D. program.

The Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) is the University's major research qualification and is administered by the School of Graduate Studies. Candidates undertake a research program which is likely to make a significant and new contribution to their discipline. Supervision is normally through a supervisory panel with one principal supervisor. The degree of Doctor of Philosophy signifies that the holder has undertaken a substantial piece of original research which has been conducted and reported by the holder under proper academic supervision and in a research environment for a prescribed period.

For those taking the coursework component option, this course will provide Ph.D. students with a quality, formal methodologic training in research methods to supplement the usual Ph.D. research project. This course has been designed to prepare students for academic careers in Clinical Research, Medical Research, Public Health Research, or for professional research-oriented careers in these fields. Formal training in research methods has become a sine qua non for a Ph.D. research higher degree training in human subject health and medical research.

#### ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Entry requirements are based on PhD entry requirements Regulation R3.60. The minimum requirement for admission to probationary candidature for Doctor of Philosophy is a four-year Honours degree from an Australian university, or a qualification or combination of qualifications considered by the University's Research Higher Degree Committee to be equivalent. For those interested in doctoral studies who do not have an Honours degree and do not have a higher research degree, masters by coursework may be accepted as a pre-requisite. Overseas students are expected to have English language competence at the minimum level of proficiency of IELTS 6.5 (written 6.0).

The graduate program of the Department of Economics is addressed to students of high promise who wish to prepare themselves in teaching and research or for responsible positions in government, research organizations, or business enterprises. Admission to the program is limited to candidates for the PhD. Students are expected to devote themselves full-time to their program of study.

During the first year of graduate study, graduate students are normally required to take formal courses in advanced microeconomic and macroeconomic theory in preparation for the required examination in economic theory. In addition, they should satisfy the course requirements in quantitative methods and may begin work on fulfillment of the distribution requirement.

In preparation for the General Oral Examination, described in more detail below, students are encouraged to choose from among about 100 courses offered each year in the department and pertinent courses offered in other departments. In some fields, but not all, there is a two-term sequence of courses intended as the basic preparation for an oral examination in the field. A student may wish to take more than two terms' work in the field chosen for the examination, including a research seminar or a reading program under the guidance of a member of the faculty

**ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS**

Previous concentration in economics is preferred but not required. Students will need a strong undergraduate training in both economics and mathematics. All applicants are required to take the GRE. If English is not the candidate's native language, there are two acceptable ways to demonstrate English proficiency:

1. Hold a degree from an institution at which English is the language of instruction
2. Score at least 215 on the computerized test and 550 on the written Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL)

The Ph.D. program is housed within the Rackham School of Graduate Studies and is a comprehensive degree program in Economics. However, it is possible for Rackham students, with the approval of their departments, to apply non-Rackham course credits toward Rackham degree requirements, usually as cognates. They may do so by completing courses offered by non-Rackham graduate or professional programs. For courses to be included on the following list, they must meet the academic standards outlined in Rackham's, "Guidelines for Graduate Course Approval," and be taught by either a regular member of the faculty or an instructor whose credentials qualify them to teach at the graduate level.

A new Interdepartmental Concentration (IC) in Global Health has been developed that focuses on public health issues resulting from the globalization of the world's economies, cultures, production systems, transnational policies, and increasingly-shared environments. National borders are rapidly becoming less restrictive to the movement of people, products, toxins, capital, and lifestyles. This is producing enormous impacts on the etiologies of diseases and efforts to promote health, in underdeveloped and developed countries alike. Students who participate in this Global Health IC will develop knowledge and skills related to issues, programs, policies and practices that alter public health risks in the context of expanding globalization. Courses in the IC will expose students to the need to take a global view of causation, expect new and changing determinants of successful interventions, and analyze problems and propose solutions in an effective manner.

#### ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

In order to be admitted to the new PhD programme you have to hold a first class undergraduate degree in economics or its equivalent, or complete such a degree before the time of enrolment. No prior MSc degree is required (*Track 1*). If you hold an MSc degree in economics, you may apply for *Track 2* entry into the new PhD programme.

Admission to the new PhD programme is highly competitive. There are no fixed rules on who will be admitted. As a general guide, successful applicants will probably score well in the 90th percentiles in each section of the GRE General Test (particularly quantitative and analytical), have performed exceptionally in their undergraduate program, and have shown some evidence of creativity and inclination towards research.

Complete applications for entry in 2004 must be received by the LSE Graduate Admissions Office before January 1, 2004. Admissions decisions will be made by a committee in the Economics Department. Applicants will be informed of the decision before April 1, 2004. If your application is successful, we expect you to let us know by April 15, 2004 whether you are planning to enrol. In order to complete your application, you will have to make sure that the LSE receives the following:

- An application form with a proposal stating your research interests and plans
- A GBP50 application fee (GBP30 for online applications)
- Transcripts/mark sheets and proof of existing qualifications
- 2 academic references from your current (or most recent) university department
- GRE scores from the General Test
- If your first language is not English, scores on the TOEFL or IELTS

Students take two years of course work. The first year is comprised of two semesters each of microeconomic theory, macroeconomic theory, and mathematical methods, and one-semester courses in statistics and econometrics. In the second year, students take electives - four in the fall semester and three in the spring semester. A list of electives can be found here. Students may also take relevant courses in related departments, such as mathematics, mathematical sciences, political science, and public health.

Recognizing that a small department cannot cover all fields, we've structured our department to have strong coverage in three broad areas - Applied Microeconomics, Economic Theory, and Macroeconomics - with Econometrics being covered by members of the Applied Micro and Macro groups. Associated with each of these core groups is a seminar which brings in top scholars from throughout the world as well as providing a forum for faculty and doctoral students to present their research.

The department's admission requirements are flexible. The admission of each applicant is by the department as a whole and rests upon his/her academic record (especially economics and mathematics courses), recommendations of scholars and instructors, GRE test scores, and other pertinent information including the match between the research interests of the applicant and the faculty. To apply for admission, an applicant must submit an official transcript of all academic work beyond secondary school and at least two letters of recommendation. Letters should come from individuals who can comment on your scholarly skills. All applicants must submit scores from the Graduate Record Examination. It is not required that students take the GRE Economics Subject Exam though it is recommended. Those applicants that do and perform well on it have an advantage in the admission process. Foreign applicants must also satisfy the department that they are fluent in English by taking the TOEFL. The department requires a TOEFL score of at least 600.

Students should have a broad background in the arts and sciences and, in particular, a knowledge of economic theory, statistics, and mathematics including differential and integral calculus and linear algebra. Almost all of our students enter with at least two semesters of calculus and linear algebra. Other mathematics courses that are recommended include a third semester of calculus, differential equations, probability, and real analysis.

The graduate economics program at Penn is a Ph.D. program administered by the Graduate Group in Economics, which consists of the faculty of the Department of Economics, and some of its affiliated faculty in the Wharton School and the School of Arts and Sciences. A master's program in Economics is not offered at the University of Pennsylvania.

The program trains students to conduct outstanding research in economics. All major areas of economics are covered, with particular strengths in theoretical and empirical microeconomics, and in modern macroeconomics. Graduates of the program obtain positions at leading universities, research institutions, and government agencies around the world.

Students in this program first acquire a thorough knowledge of economic theory and econometric methods before they begin their own research. They meet a series of requirements during their first years in the program, and thereafter devote most of their time to the writing of a dissertation. The median length of time required for completion is 5.25 years. Almost all students are supported by combinations of fellowships, research assistantships, and teaching assistantships during at least their first five years of study.

Students may enter the Ph.D. program **only in the fall**. Applicants must present evidence of a baccalaureate degree or its equivalent, or show that they can expect such a degree by the time they begin graduate work. The University provides a standard admissions form. The applicant must provide transcripts from each university attended as well as three letters of recommendation, usually from professors who can judge the student's potential for high-quality academic work. Results of the Graduate Record Examination (GRE) must also be submitted. This test should be taken as early as possible to ensure that the results are received in time to be considered by the admissions committee.

The program's goal is to admit 20 to 25 students a year. Applicants should be aware that the admissions committee must review a large number of applications (close to 1000 last year). Our decisions on admission and financial aid are facilitated when application materials are clearly presented, typed if possible, well written, and concise. In recent years we have in general only accepted students with quantitative and verbal scores above 700 though we are more lenient on the verbal score for students whose native language is not English. The committee tries to form an image of the intellectual and personal qualities of applicants, and then admits those who seem most likely to do high quality work. All applicants are encouraged to provide additional information that might help the admissions committee in their task. For example, students might wish to submit research papers that they have written or a description of some major job experience related to economic analysis.

The University must receive complete applications of students applying for financial aid by December 15th. The admissions committee then examines completed applications, which have been received; notification of its decision is sent by April 15th. While the University does accept other applications up to July 15th, the Economics graduate group often closes its admissions by May 1st or earlier.

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
